
Let's look at...Year 11 Agriculture

Year 11 Agriculture students have been studying seed germination and recently focused on the influence of factors on the germination rate of barley seeds. Students chose to investigate the impact of soil depths on germination and conducted a practical experiment. They found that shallow soil depths resulted in slower and uneven germination, indicating limited nutrient availability and moisture retention. In contrast, deeper soil depths facilitated faster and more uniform germination, suggesting improved nutrient access and moisture retention. This highlights the importance of proper soil preparation for successful seed germination and showcases the students' dedication to understanding agricultural processes.






**Learning intention (know)**: The quality of a place influences the quality of life for the people who live there.

## Let the numbers do the talking: What does attendance mean to your education?

#### To the students

No matter how exciting the lesson plan, how engaging the unit of work, how creative the classroom task - if you are not there, you can't learn!

There is roughly 40 weeks of schooling in a year, (give or take a few as you get into the senior years). So, that means across years 7 to 9, the school calendar plans roughly 120 weeks' worth of classes; 200 days a year; or if looking at the same time period above, that's 600 days across years 7 to 9 in schooling.

Now, if we take away a number of public holidays, student free days, and a school closure, that yearly number becomes 190. So, our new total would then be 570.

If we factor in, that on average, most people get a bit crook at some point across the year for a few days, and have the odd day off here and there for family reasons, (holiday, granddad's interstate birthday...), safe calculation could be to take another 15 days off this total, to get 555.

Already, the challenge of maximising 600 days to learn the content of years 7 through to 9 is squeezed into 555 days.

This is made even harder, for those of you choosing not to attend regularly, with it having an impact on your ability to learn the curriculum. What if you took a day off each week? A day where you couldn't be bothered with school. Maybe a day where you just stayed at home - couched it. One day a week each year is 40 additional days, a total of 120 off our total of 555. Obviously, this is an extreme example to consider, but the increased difficulty of trying to complete 3 years of education in 435 days is challenging for anyone to consider!

To let the numbers do the talking, you would be expecting to complete 3 years' worth of education in 1.19 years. If we look at adding similar numbers to years 10, 11 and 12, regular non-attendance potentially robs you of nearly 2 and a half years' worth of schooling throughout your time at school!

Your teachers are continually working on learning goals, teaching programs and learning experiences, that help you develop, grow and build skills across different curriculum, improving your literacy and numeracy. This growth and development does not happen if you are not at school.

Take a moment to count your numbers and days. How much of your school is impacted by the choices made to stay away and not attend?

#### To the parents/caregivers

The teachers at Penola High School have been discussing strategies and ways to target attendance of students. We want to see those who are facing challenges, coming to school. We want to find ways to support your student to realise learning opportunities are better by being at school.

We understand that things happen outside of school that can have an impact on attendance, and we understand that the story and context of each individual around attendance has a place in each student's journey. We want to encourage all students to attend as best they can, and maintain high attendance, or improve low to medium attendance. Home groups will be setting group goals/targets to support each other in achieving this. High attendance will be acknowledged, and those that attain the highest attendance possible, will receive special recognition for their efforts.

Next term we will be focusing on helping all students improve attendance to improve learning opportunities.
